This Month:

before anyone else gets them. Our newer members will be delighted to find that the little grey cells will be exercised only in the pursuit of fleeting fame as the possible winner of our annual postprandial "A Game on the Theme of Rhododendrons".

A few years ago we introduced our readers to the appropriate protocol and the mysteries of Punch Bowl A and Punch Bowl B with the following pithy outline:
